## ABOUT THE FILM

**AIRMAN: The Extraordinary Life of Calvin G. More**t" is a transmedia film and community engagement project based on the life and legacy of the last living Tuskegee Airman of Louisiana.


The first part of documenting the film spans the last 32 months of Mr. Moret's life. This involves a series of documented, exclusive interviews that took place at his home where we intimately discussed private and public aspects of Mr. Moret's inspiring life. During this time, exclusive footage was additionally obtained from following him on the road as he gave talks on what it meant to be a Tuskegee Airman, this legacy, and present day implications.

The second part of documenting the film involves interviews that take place after the passing of Mr. Moret. These will reflect on the meaning of his life, the role he and the Airmen played in history-making social change, and Mr. Moret's extraordinary life and legacy. These involve insights from Tuskegee Airmen historians and New Orleans community leaders. But in particular, there are interviews planned with black aviators whose lives either intersected or were inspired by the life of Mr. Moret. As the film will reveal, these black aviators represent the modern day professional descendants of the legacy of the history making Tuskegee Airmen.

Curiously this generation of **black aviator**s now embody the spirit of **Mr. Moret** as they "pass on" lessons, stories, and aviation opportunities to youth in their own communities.

In summary, because while he was with us, Mr. Moret felt so strong a call to tell the stories of the Airmen's experiences, the talks at his home and on the road will serve as a springboard from which to tell a much deeper story. "So much isn't written down" he would say, and then elaborate on how lucky he felt to still be alive to tell the stories. He'd continue, "especially since the Tuskegee Airmen cannot pass on their experiences in full. We can't preserve the Tuskegee Airmen. Once we're gone, we're gone."

It is this call that informed his sense of responsibility about the **Airmen** as he made ongoing appearances across the South to tell the stories that would have otherwise gone untold.
